Helping Hand Cemetery is the first organized African-American cemetery in the Town of Courtland. Research by the current Helping Hand Cemetery Club, descendants of the original trustees of 1897, has revealed through donated family records that prior to the cemetery's official purchase in 1897, the land was used as an

Today, there are over 500 known graves and approximately 175 unknown graves located in the cemetery. These unknown graves were discovered with the use of a GPR (Ground Penetrating Radar) machine by a Preservation Virginia technician.

Located in the cemetery is a mixture of individual grave mounds, old headstones, new headstones, and small monuments. The primary and only recently built building is a brick kiosk containing a directory, map and location information to assist the increased number of visitors to the cemetery. An attempt at building a path throughout the cemetery for wheelchair access and walking aids was recently created; however, this needs to be professionally redone. (See accompanying picture.)

Helping Hand Cemetery is also used for ceremonies and educational exhibits. Many of those buried represent the founders and builders of the first African-American community of Courtland, a town noted for its segregated communities. Also buried in the cemetery are Native Americans who lived on the land that was once the site of the Nottoway Indian Reservation.

- We recently built a brick kiosk on the cemetery grounds to provide information for the increasing number of visitors.
- The cemetery is located approximately 300 yards from the Nottoway River on the western side and lies adjacent to the main road (#35, Jerusalem Plank Road) on the eastern side.
- On the north side is a driveway from the main road to a house in the rear. This driveway is used by the cemetery as well as the occupants of the house and separates the cemetery from an unused parcel of land owned by a resident of the Town. This arrangement leaves cemetery visitors with no parking space.
- On the roadside (eastern perimeter) there is a ten-year old fence (approximately 5 feet tall) which has now been compromised by deer who have dislodged or bent the rails in several places.
- Surrounding the remaining borders of the cemetery is either a wooden fence owned by the owners of a house located on the south side, or weak wire fencing compromised by the tenants of the houses who cut through the cemetery to reach the main road.

4. Property's History and Significance (Please do not exceed one page)

An historic highway marker has been approved for The Helping Hand Cemetery, located within the Courtland historic district. (Estimated date of arrival is April 2023.) The Cemetery itself is historic having been purchased in 1897 by the ancestors of the current Board of Trustees. (Please see the deed, dated 1897) One of the trustees at that time, Rev. O.G. Jenkins with the help of retired Judge J.B. Prince also founded a boarding school for African-American children in 1903 and established a Courtland bank for Blacks. (This was an extraordinary accomplishment for an African-American in a segregated town.)

Less than half a mile from the Cemetery is the courthouse in which the enslaved Nat Turner was tried and found guilty for his rebellion. Closer than that in the black community of Courtland is where Nat Turner and his followers were hung and the followers thrown into a mass grave. (National Geographic GPR results). This history has increased public interest in our cemetery and has contributed to the increased number of visitors.

After its purchase in 1897 the cemetery was called The Courtland Colored Cemetery, which was changed in 1912 to the Helping Hand Cemetery, owned and managed by the Helping Hand Club. The Club also established in 1912 a health and welfare fund and a system of pre-paying for funeral plots. Ledgers beginning in 1912 list the individual names of many of Southampton County's African-Americans who paid into this fund. Names from these ledgers are often requested by visitors who are searching for ancestors and deceased relatives.

Buried in The Helping Hand Cemetery are over 500 Black and Native American citizens of Southampton County, residing in the area in the late 1800's and early 1900's, and who were responsible for building an independent African-American community including a Rosenwald School, stores and shops. Also located in Helping Hand are approximately 175 unknown graves below surface documented by a GPR (ground penetrating radar) machine and technician from Preservation Virginia.

Even the trees located on the cemetery grounds are historic. At least two trees have been described by the Department of Forestry as being approximately 300 years old. Unfortunately, for safety reasons, we were forced to cut one down; however, we have since labeled most of the trees and explained the use of the species during our tours and events.

Buried in Helping Hand are African American and Native American teachers, activists, entrepreneurs, builders, farmers and close to 50 veterans, including a Civil War veteran.

Helping Hand Cemetery, along with its historical exhibits and events, has proven itself to be the only positive historical resource for Courtland's African-American community and its children. Our Helping Hand Board of Trustees (Club), club members, and the descendants and families of those buried in the cemetery meet to share stories and to participate in ancestral events. Thus, the Helping Hand Cemetery is of considerable significant importance to the Courtland community.



I am pleased to send official notification that the Virginia Board of Historic Resources approved the Helping Hand Cemetery highway marker at its meeting on March 17, 2022. The final text is as follows:


Helping Hand Cemetery

Six African American trustees purchased this land in 1897 and established The Courtland Colored Cemetery, renamed Helping Hand Cemetery in 1912. The Helping Hand Club, a benevolent organization founded by educator Ersulia Wynn Evans, offered health and burial insurance to community members. Among the approximately 650 persons interred here is Pvt. Solomon Stevens, who escaped from slavery in Southampton Co. during the Civil War, served in the Union Army, and in 1913 sold a parcel of land to the Helping Hand trustees to enlarge the cemetery. Also buried here are about 55 other military veterans, Nottoway Indians whose ancestral lands were in this area, and educators, activists, and entrepreneurs.
